# **Amber Class Curriculum**

It's another exciting topic in Amber Class this half term. We will be learning all about growth and change. The children have decided they would like to learn about the following things:

- How the weather changes.
- How trees grow.
- How humans grow.
- How the days of the week change.
- How animals change and grow.
- How flowers and grass grow and change.
- The lifecycle of a frog.
- The lifecycle of a butterfly.
- What animals and humans need to grow.

In English we will find out about baby animals and how we change as we grow. We will collect ideas for beginnings, middles and ends of stories and use a class story as a basis for writing our own. We will also compare fictional and factual texts and learn what fiction and non-fiction means. We currently have a Garden Centre set up in the classroom that the children have enjoyed playing with and have explored writing lists and labels - who knows what our Garden Centre will become next week! We will be planting seeds and also growing our own bean plant. Year 1 children will also be keeping their own bean plant diary to see the changes of the bean as it grows. In Maths, Reception children will be learning about height and length and measuring objects using non-standard units of measure; Beginning to understand the concept of time; Comparing numbers to 10; Learning about number bonds to 10; 3D shapes and patterns.

Year 1 children will be learning about place value of numbers to 50; Counting in 2's and 5's; Comparing length and height; Measuring length; Beginning to understand and measure weight, mass and capacity.

The whole class will be spending lots of time outside as usual and are looking forward to finding things that grow and change in the garden. We will also be doing lots of fun Easter activities and learning about the Easter story. We're all very excited for our new topic, it's going to be a fun one! The Amber Class Team

# Sapphire Class Curriculum

This half term sees us start off with a science focus on finding out about what plants need to grow well and we will learn to label the different parts of a flowering plant. We will spend time sowing seeds and potting them on to grow outside in our raised bed. We look forward to learning to identify common types of plant found locally.

In English we will be sharing several poems by the award-winning poet laureate, Carol Ann Duffy. Children will be creating their own poetic verses and discussing and learning some favourite simple poems. We will be practising using our voices in different ways: whispering, work voices, presenting, singing, exclaiming and questioning. We will be looking at different types of sentences as well as learning to put adverbs into our writing. The story, Slug Needs a Hug will provide stimulus for independent story writing and a non-fiction piece too. We will continue our daily phonics sessions and children may move around groups in response to recent assessement. In handwriting we will be encouraging all Year 2s to start to join at least 2 letters in every word as we have learnt most of our main joins. Spellings continue every Friday. Please do support your child to learn and practise them at home as they are so proud when they do well.

Maths sees us working more on 3d shape, identifying their properties (sides, vertices, line of symmetry, right angles) as well as continuing our work on division and multiplicatipon (mainly within the 2,3,5 and 10 times tables for Year 2s). Year 1s will be working on place value up to 50. We will all also be looking at mass, capacity and temperature.

Our RE focus will look at a different religion and the children will be able to see how Hindus have different views about the idea of 'God'.

We will have PE on Tuesdays and Fridays and will be learning early hockey skills as well as developing our teamwork and leadership skills. We will also enjoy practising throwing and catching skills, in readiness for handball. **Please ensure that everyone has a warm pair of jogging pants and a sweatshirt as we may be outside for PE.** 

In our Life Skills lessons we will be using the Pantosaurus song and message to support our learning on child protection. The NSPCC have produced this series of lessons for our age group and the children really enjoy the fun approach with a serious message. We will also be looking at how families can look different, including an age appropriate story with characters in a same sex relationship.

Mrs. Moulton will be teaching us for computing and will be introducing the children to quizzes.

We will continue to lend Mabel and Malcom, our sock monkeys to children at the weekends and if you have any special events you would like them to accompany you to, please ask for them! The children are always so excited to share their photos and adventures with the class.

Miss Buttifant will be with us this half term and will continue to work closely with Mrs. Frost to plan and deliver exciting lessons to Sapphire Class. She has become a very important member of our class and the children work very well with her.

• If children wish to practise their maths at home, 'Hit the Button' is a super online game which covers doubles, halves and number bonds as well as times tables. 

Emerald Class Curriculum

Welcome back everyone, I hope you all had a relaxing half term. We have a jam packed mini half term coming up with lots of fun and interesting things happening!

In English we are focusing on basic SPAG skills and story writing as well as continuing our Tutankhamun and Woof texts.

In Maths we are continuing fractions then looking at decimals before moving on to measuring. We will as ever be focusing on our times tables and our four written methods.

In P.E. we are starting a new unit of Hockey but also beginning Handball which is new to the curriculum this year. The children already seem super excited about it. We will have an after school club to give them all extra opportunities to practise! The Colby Value will be 'Creativity' this term, with children thinking about how to create and improve activities.

In Science we are undertaking several investigations and thinking about how to question and think critically and fairly about science.

Ms Everett will continue to teach R.E on Thursdays, Alice will be switching back to French this term and Mrs Moulton will continue to teach Computing.

In Art, we have already begun to work on side portraits, with the children very excited about our final piece and how we can link it with our Egypt topic. We have switched to Geography for the rest of this term and will be looking at countries that we know and where they are in relation to the whole world. We will be looking at key words such as Hemisphere and Lines of Latitude.

As ever please encourage children to read at home at least 4 times each week and keep on top of spellings and tables practice.

## **Ruby Class Curriculum**

This half term Ruby Class will be continuing with our film project. We will be writing a narrative, more scriptwriting and a diary as our genres of writing. We will also continue to film our projects ready for our film premiere next term. We will also continue to learn our spellings weekly. Please encourage your child to learn the words. If they forget their spelling books or are away on Monday, they are accessible on Google Classroom and Spelling Shed.

Please can you make sure that your children are learning these weekly as well as reading daily. Please can I remind you to sign your child's reading records when they have read at home. The children can enter the details about what they have read but we would like an adult to sign each time they know they have read.

In maths, we will finish learning about ordering decimals and understanding what percentages are. After this we will be learning about perimeter and area then finally ending the term learning about graphs and tables in statistics. We will also continue to improve the speed of our times tables with the times tables tests on a Friday morning. I have been very impressed so far with the children this year but regular practice will keep these tables in their heads. We will also be continuing to improve our calculation methods. It would benefit your child if you could give them addition, subtraction, multiplication (up to 4 x 2 digits) and division (Up to 4 digits) questions at home. Please send them with any work they have done and I can reward them appropriately.

Our geography topic this term is rivers. We will be learning about some major rivers in the UK and world as well as finding about the different features of a river. We will also find out about erosion and deposition on our rivers and what this means. This will lead to them learning about oxbow lakes too.

In science we will be learning about food and digestion. This will include looking at the different teeth we have, how food is digested and what the different parts of our digestive system do.

Music this term will continue to be learning the recorder.

In PE, they will continue to have lessons with Mr Brown and Ben. This term they are learning a new sport called handball as well as hockey.


Design and technology will be with Mr Frost and they will be looking at spices and creating some of their own spices.

In computing, they will be learning about audio and video editing. They will be able to use some of the videos they have taken for our film project and see how they can improve them.

In French with Mr Mead, they will learn vocabulary relating to the world.

In RE, they will be learning about the Jewish Passover.

#### Mrs Towers



Hi, I hope you all had a great break.

I'd like to share with you what the children are learning this half-term:

Maths: Obviously, with the National Tests coming up, the children will get lots of practice answering word problems and gain better strategies for unpicking longer questions whilst revising all of KS2 concepts. We are particularly looking at ratio and proportion.

Science: Our science is exploring electricity and we will be practising creating circuits that could power our cars in D.T

English: We have two of our six final pieces of writing completed and we will be looking to add two more. Firstly, a scientific description of a creature followed by a newspaper report. We will also be analysing the poem 'The Jabberwocky'.

Geography: In geography, we are exploring mapping by looking at atlases, coordinates, and looking at how physical features are represented on maps.

P.E: (Wednesday/Friday) P.E is handball on a Wednesday afternoon and Hockey on a Friday afternoon. Children need to be ready to do outdoor sport on Friday. They will need warm clothes and a pair of trainers solely for outdoors or studded boots/astros as it gets slippery. If they have their own hockey sticks they are welcome to bring them in. Mouth guards and shin pads would be useful, but not compulsory.

R.E: We will be exploring how belief in Islam has impacted on art through history.

D.T: D.T is really exciting this half-term. The children will each make a motorized car with wood and circuits. We will aim to finish them early in the next half-term as this one is so short. We will eventually race them and have prizes!

Computing: Liz will be looking at selection in quizzes / variables in games / sensing Microbits.

Music: Mrs Towers will be teaching song composition to Amethyst and will build on what they remember so far.

Life Skills: Topics to covered this half-term include: Care in the sun and dangers of over exposure, sleep, and personal hygiene.

Teachers are looking forward to meeting with you next week. Please arrive at Colby School just before your appointment time, entering through the main gate by the flagpole.


